In 1895, when Theta Pond was built it was originally across from a barn, so the original name of Theta Pond is Horse Barn after the barn that used to be there. This pond served as a reservoir for the horses at Horse Barn back in the day. The barn ended up burning down in 1922, but the pond was expanded upon and renamed. Horse Pond then took after the name, Theta Pond, because the closest building to the barn had been the sorority house Kappa Alpha Theta. In the earlier years of Oklahoma State University, the college often held tug-of-war competitions where the losers would get dunked into the lake. Theta Pond showcases some of Oklahoma State University's

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history around the pond. The pond has many traditions, especially during homecoming. During Homecoming week, they set up lights all around the pond so it appears to be orange. Across from the pond, all of the sorority and fraternity homecoming decks are up during the entire week. Theta Pond during Homecoming is at the center of homecoming activities and greek life decks.

Today, Theta Pond is no longer across from Kappa Alpha Theta, but it is across from Zeta Tau Alpha. Zeta Tau Alpha purchased Kappa Alpha Theta's land after Kappa Alpha Theta burned down. Zeta Tau Alpha takes pride in being the house across from Theta Pond, not only is it a beautiful sight, but also a great place to go sit and think. Zeta Tau Alpha has many balconies which someone can sit out on and look over at the pond. When asked what Lauren Millis used Theta Pond for she responded, "I used Theta Pond as a calming place to do homework, especially across the street from the pond at Zeta. I also used it as a place to have nice walks with my friends." Many girls from Zeta Tau Alpha enjoy taking their photos at Theta Pond because of how close to the house it is.

Theta Pond is home to many different types of wildlife. There are geese, ducks with funky feather styles, and at one point there even used to be an alligator in the pond. Lauren Millis commented on why she believes Theta Pond is so special, "I think the ducks make theta special. Everyone in the community can come feed the ducks at Theta Pond, which makes it more than just an on campus attraction. Eskimo Joe's

For over three decades now, Eskimo Joe's has been a favorite restaurant amongst OSU students and a huge attraction for Stillwater. It's a widely recognized location, even by two former Presidents, George H. W. Bush and George W. Bush, who both endorsed Joe's cheese fries during their presidencies. The restaurant's two mascots, Joe and Buffy, can often be also found at Oklahoma State sporting events where they take pictures with fans and throw shirts to the crowds.

Eskimo Joe's first opened as a bar in 1975. Back then the drinking age was still 18 years old, so most college students were able to get in, but when the legal drinking age changed in the 80's, so did Eskimo Joe's setup. Joe's became a proper restaurant to accommodate for potential losses, and as a result became what we all now know and love. The glass dome roof was added in 1992, this roof is able to open up on nice days and its addition greatly increased the number of occupants. Joe's has always been very adaptable for its customers and the students, which is one of the main qualities that's kept it alive and thriving.

The restaurant's founders were two Oklahoma State

alumni, Stan Clark and Steve File, who spontaneously came up with the idea to open a bar in a for rent building they knew of south of campus. The two quickly got to work on their idea, they had a premise, a building, but now they needed a face for the bar. Clark and File commissioned Bill Thompson to draw their logo. Bill was only a freshman when he drew the famous logo that can still be seen on advertisements and t-shirts all over. Eskimo Joe's opened as a bar on July 21, 1975. When it opened, the bar sold beer and 72 different t-shirts.

When Joe's opened as a restaurant, their food items were simple, but have managed to remain iconic through the years. The cheese fries have gotten the most attention, having been mentioned by former President George H. W. Bush in a 1990 speech. Former President George W. Bush also endorsed the cheese fries in 2006. Over the years the restaurant has also been mentioned by more than one late night talk show, Jimmy Fallon and Stephen Colbert respectively.

The store and its merchandise are as famous as the restaurant itself. Bill Thompson's logo can be seen on shirts worn all over the country, and most of those t-shirts were sold here in Stillwater. When you go to Joe's, you're given a souvenir cup that you get to take home, more cups are also available in the shop. During the month of July, in celebration of Eskimo Joe's anniversary, special shirts and souvenir cups are sold with designs to correlate with the yearly celebration. During the holiday season, smaller Eskimo Joe's venues open up in select malls and shopping centers across the state, and at these small venues they sell Joe's merchandise.

In 2011 the larger store was added onto the restaurant, greatly expanding the building's size. With this add on

they were able to sell more merchandise, as well as hold more people in the building. Anyone who's gone to Joe's later in the football season or during the basketball seasons has likely been thankful they can wait in the large gift shop rather than out in the cold. When describing the restaurant in her college years, LaDonna Bornemann, a 1987 OSU graduate, said, "Try imagining it was ½ of the size of the bar and restaurant as it is now." This goes to show just how much the restaurant has changed over the years, but also how it's still the same iconic place it's always been.

Most students who are attending Oklahoma State or alumni who've attended in the past can say that they've gone to Joe's. LaDonna Bornemann, "went to Eskimo Joe's probably once a week" and she said, "It was a good time with friends, day or night. Good food and just a neat, fun atmosphere." Joe's was described by LaDonna as, "pretty popular when I was in College, which was in the Fall of 1983 through Spring 1987." LaDonna was five months away from her twenty-first birthday when the legal drinking age was changed, but she remembers celebrating her twenty-first at Eskimo Joe's.

Eskimo Joe's is located on Elm Avenue, otherwise known as the strip. The strip is home to many bars and restaurants. It's located just south of the OSU campus, making it a big attraction for students. Its convenient location for students has also helped the business thrive. Being in the middle of the strip has put Joe's in the thick of the action over the years which has allowed the restaurant and store to spread outside of their original location.

Over the years, Eskimo Joe's has expanded into different restaurants. These other locations are all in Stillwater and have different cultural themes for their food. Mexico Joe's

is perhaps the most famous of these variations. The Mexico Joe's mascot is similar to his original counterpart, but he dawns a sombrero and a poncho, and is accompanied by his donkey, Bucky. Joseppi's was an Italian restaurant, and together Eskimo Joe's, Mexico Joe's, and Joseppi's were known as the "Three Amigos". Joseppi's would go on to close in 2014, and was succeeded by the short lived Mojo's.

In 1985 there was a party held to celebrate the restaurant's tenth anniversary, but this party ended up being so big that thousands of people were flooding the street. From there on, every year on July 21 there's a party in honor of Eskimo Joe's founding. Their popular merchandise often gets an anniversary theme around this time as well, feeding into the hype. As previously mentioned, the crowd has gotten as large as in the thousands, with some people coming from far and wide to attend the yearly celebration. It's of course during the Summer months, so it's not the hugest event for students, but it is a staple of the restaurant nonetheless.

Just as Pistol Pete represents OSU at sporting events, Joe and Buffy also come to support the teams and promote their restaurant. They often hang out near the student section and home locker room, throwing out t-shirts during select timeouts. Sometimes rather than throwing the t-shirts out, they bring out a revolving cannon that can shoot the shirts into higher sections. Their presence is a reminder of how closely tied they are to OSU. Joe and Buffy come to every home game, so they're hard to miss. During football games, the pair can usually be found standing near the Northwest corner of the field. So students, be on the lookout, as a t-shirt might come your way!

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Eskimo Joe's is a staple of Stillwater and Oklahoma State. It's the site of many good memories for many people and many more people to come. Over the years it has changed quite a bit, but it's maintained its iconic status by being a friendly business and by having an active part in its community. What once started as a sudden idea between two friends has become something much bigger and it shows no signs of slowing down.

The Student Union is a very important location on campus for all students, faculty, and visitors that tour campus. As a quick overview, the Student Union is located near the South-East edge of the campus and is a large building of 650,000+ sq. ft. according to the Oklahoma State University's campus website. It is currently the largest student union in the nation and was originally constructed with \$4.3 million dollars funded through a self-imposed tax from the students at the university, and a \$68 million dollar renovation that was completed in 2012 that was also funded through the student body. It is by far the center for celebrations and events that happen here at Oklahoma State University, with some examples being Poketober, the Spirit walk that happens before every football game, and many, many other celebrations and events that happen throughout the school year. It harbors many different restaurants that are staffed through the university dining services, of which a large portion are students. It has a large theater room, a

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ball room, an expansive dining area, many study sections, computers available for student use, a hotel, parking garage, and many other services and offices available for student use.

To be able to give this full encompassing profile of the Student Union, I interviewed two people, one of which is Luke Ivey, a close friend of mine and a frequent user of the Union. According to Luke, "I end up doing my homework there every day because I like it more than the library. Something about the noise makes the homework better, I guess. O'Colly TV Studios

The O'Colly TV studios is the headquarters of broadcast production at Oklahoma State. Located on the third floor of the Paul Miller Journalism building, students can learn the ins and outs of TV production and the elements that are required. At first it may seem like a lot, but the more you break it down the easier it is to understand. This first-hand look will help explain the whole process and give people a feel for production. The first thing you see when you walk in is cameras, back drops, and lights. You can also hear a difference with the sound absorbing walls that surround the studio. There are wires and cables that seem to go in all different directions. Everything in the room has its own special purpose and contributes to the overall production. Before I go into detail, here is some brief historical background on the Studio. Student News Director Ryan Carns said, "They built the studio with the building, but they didn't use it very often. They only started using it about five or six years ago when they started the shows."

To start off with the main floor of the studio. One of the first things you see when you walk in the room is the backdrop panels. These are what the audience sees in the background during the live shows. There are two sets totaling to six individual panels. They are blue and connect to create the image of Edmond Low library. There is one set on each side of the room. This way we can operate two news desks at once if needed. This brings me to the next thing you will usually see in the studio, the news desks. Along with the panels there are two desks set up on opposite sides of the room. The desk furthest from the front door has a set of XLR microphones attached as well as an audio mixer. This is where you can control the master settings on the mics like sound level and balance. The news desk is where the anchors are seated, and this is also what the viewers at home will see in the live shot. The desks are wooden and have a glass finish on top. The desks are big enough to sit two or three anchors depending on how many are needed. Though Ryan says typically there are two news anchors for most live shows.

Moving on to probably the most important item in studio production, cameras. There is a three-camera set up in the studio. This allows for two tight shots, (which are just close shots) and a wide shot. They can rotate 360 degrees and the camera stand has wheels on it, so they are maneuverable. This is so we can utilize both news desks and the greenscreen which is just a portion of the wall on the right side of the room that is painted green that can have graphics inserted. The cameras are manned by cameramen whose primary job is to make sure everything is in frame. Cameramen also focus and check the Iris of the camera but that is an explanation for another essay. The

cameramen also use hand signals to communicate to the news anchors during the live shows.

The next thing you will notice when you first walk into the studio is directly above you. What appears to be a jungle gym of cables and cords is the lighting set up. All the light panels are attached to a track system that allows the crew to position them wherever they are needed. These panels are square, and they produce a bunch of light. Some even compare it to a miniature version of the sun. Lighting on set is very important. It may seem like a simple task, but a lot more thought goes into this process then one might think. You must compensate for the contrast and brightness of the light as well as shadows, which is the most difficult thing. Typically, the lights stay in the same place, so it is one less thing the crew has to worry about when setting up for the shows. The other cables strung across the top are primarily just power cables. At first glance they look like snakes hanging from a tree, but not to fear their purpose is to keep the equipment plugged in and powered up.

Ryan gave me some more insight on what the studio is and what they produce. He said they use the studio to stream the live news casts every Friday at five, he also said it is used to record podcast and even weather forecasts. These are just a few examples of the types of shows produced in the studio with the equipment mentioned before. Ryan also gave a base rundown of the equipment in the control room used and said, "most of it is just a typical setup you would see in a real newsroom, like a switcher, graphics machines and prompters." He compared most of the equipment to news studios in the real world considering the purpose of the O'Colly studio is to prepare students for this type of environment.

Now that everything in the main part of the studio has been introduced, let's move on to what goes on upstairs in the control room. Think of this as the brain of the whole operation. This is where all the producers work during the live shows. Ryan said, "typically we have a technical director, graphics operator, playback operator, and a prompter." Everything the audience sees on screen is controlled in this room. The first thing you'll see when you walk in is a bunch of monitors against the wall. These display all three camera shots, graphics, playback footage, teleprompter, and the live shot If there is one. This is the centralized location for all the footage either being live streamed or recorded. Everything that is being captured is controlled here. The main producer is the head honcho in the room. He or she uses a switcher which is pretty much just a giant button display used to control cameras, graphics, transitions, etc. The news director is not alone in this room, a crewmember stands by for graphics, playback, and teleprompter. Graphics are just the little name tags or images you see on screen during the broadcast. For example, when the news anchors introduce themselves, a small name plate with their full name and occasionally a social media handle will appear in the bottom corner of the screen. All graphics are pre downloaded on a computer before the stream starts and are then uploaded directly to the switcher for use. This same concept is used for playback. This is anything from packages (which are just prerecorded news stories), to B-roll (which is just extra footage of the subject being discussed). A crewmember uploads the footage to the computer before going live, and then inserts the footage when directed to do so. The other important job this person is tasked with is countdown. The playback operator is able it sees the time length of

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each video and it is their job to remind others of the time, so everyone stays on task. Then there is the teleprompter operator. The teleprompter is a special kind of one-sided glass that is situated on the front of the cameras that reflects the image of the written script for the news anchors to read. There is a monitor attached beneath that is producing this image. The teleprompter operator is tasked with controlling the speed of how fast the teleprompter scrolls. He or she is given a control box with a purple knob on it that controls the speed. The last thing that is a part of the control room is below. The audio room, which houses audio mixers and microphones. This is where all master audio is controlled and is always crewed by an audio engineer.

The O'Colly TV studio offers a lot of great experience for those interested in learning tv and news production. It is set up just like a real studio and has a functioning crew that students can be a part of. Experience is probably the most important thing when trying to find a job after graduation and this is the perfect opportunity. I hope this inside look at the studio inspires media students to become a part of the O'Colly crew.

Saving Seats

Here at Oklahoma State University, there are many different types of on campus living options. 15 residential halls are dedicated to LLPs. That stands for Living Learning Programs. They are described by the university as "specialized living environments that connect students inside and outside their academic experiences" (Okstate

Website). There is a long application process that goes along with this option that is also based on criteria like major or age. Students that get accepted into one of these programs have a direct outlet to experiences within the classroom and outside events and programs. Joining a LLP is a great way to make friends and build connections with people that have similar interests to you.

The specific LLP that I want to take a deeper look at is the Fergusons Freshmen in Transition or FIT program. This is a specific living learning program that has some requirements and some specifically for Freshmen in Transition is obviously the student has to be an incoming freshmen. They have to be enrolled as a full time student within the Ferguson College of Agriculture here at Oklahoma State University. Applications open up in October once you have been accepted as a student at Oklahoma State University. The process is a little long but worth it. They release acceptances in waves, and the first wave happens in December. How FIT works specifically is that the application opens and stays open through the summer but once it fills up, then people are placed on a waitlist. New waves of acceptances happen every couple of months.

Today, I am a student here at Oklahoma State University and I am enrolled in the Freshmen in Transition program. I went through the application process and was accepted. I applied at the end of January and was accepted into the program in early march. I have some insight that might be beneficial to incoming students in the future. The person I decided to interview is Markel Harris, the head director of Freshman in Transition. I decided to interview him because he was a student in FIT when he went to school here and became the head director

a couple years after that. Markel Harris attended Oklahoma State University starting in 2015. In the interview he started to tell me that he was a first generation college student and African American. He was already intimidated with the college process so when he got accepted into the FIT program it took a little bit of stress off of his shoulders. He found out about this living learning program through his connections with FFA. He was a state officer and some of his fellow officers were a part of FIT before he enrolled at OSU which led him to apply. When asking him what his definition of a living learning program is, he responded with "a place where you get the out of class experience as well as the in class experience." He goes on to say that it is beneficial to participate in an organization like FIT because you are surrounded by people that share the same interests and are all going through the same experience that you are going through. Having people back you up makes the transition into freshman year slightly easier.

I was going to follow up by asking how he heard about this program and his experience applying but he answered it while talking about the significance of this program. We have similar experiences with how we both heard it from our peers. I knew who my roommate was going to be before I moved into the dorm hall. She had talked to me about wanting to be in this program together and I told her as long as we both get accepted I am fine with living in the FIT dorm. Luckily, we both ended up getting accepted and becoming roommates. I had then asked Markel what his experience was like when he was a member of this program back in 2015. He told me many stories about how it was overwhelming because they expected too much out of the students and it was difficult. He stated "While

trying to balance school, we had many assignments we had to submit, they thought it was benefiting us but it was making all of our lives a little bit more difficult." He continues to say that minus being overwhelmed we would never take back the opportunity that he was given. He enjoyed the community aspect as a whole and the experiences that they went through. It was super interesting what was soon to come because I asked him how the program has changed and how he views the program now that he is in charge of it.

He told me that he felt like he had a leg up because he has experienced the program and knows what it is like to be an overwhelmed freshman. He went into detail about how the director at the time didn't make it a priority to get to know the students and what they were involved with. He wanted to change that. He also took out silly things that he didn't see the need for to help make the college transition less overwhelming. "I have better insight because I have been in the students' shoes, I have been a first generation college student trying to figure things out, I know what helped me, I took that in order to increase future students' experiences." He wants to make it his priority that we get the most out of this program to set a good foundation for the rest of our career here at Oklahoma State University. He said one of the most important jobs is that he wants to challenge us to grow as individuals and academically without stressing us out too much. He wants to support us holistically rather than just making sure we succeed academically.

Not a whole lot of people know about Living Learning Programs and I think that needs to change. It is a great opportunity to get plugged into a community that is experiencing the same thing you are. I have enjoyed just

these short seven weeks here at Oklahoma State. There is a great resource that can be found on the schools website but I feel that advertising for Living Learning Programs could be improved. Many people I talk to on a daily basis have never heard about FIT or LLPs in general which doesn't benefit anyone if they have never heard about it. There are fifteen here at Oklahoma State University and I only know about three of them. It is significant to find a great community that will support you as you continue your path during college and also helps you develop great habits and leadership skills. The bonds you make with the people when you first start college will most likely be the people that support you until you graduate or even for the rest of your life time.

Edmon Low Library

The current Oklahoma State University library was constructed in nineteen fifty three as a part of President Henry G. Bennetts' twenty five year plan to develop the campus. His plan was to center the campus around a new library and so he acquired the help of library director Edmon Low and they quickly put the project into action. The Edmon Low library was constructed in the center of campus and with its beautiful Georgian style architecture, it quickly became a popular spot to study for many students due to its multiple floors that vary in noise intensity.

Before the construction of Edmon Low, the university had housed the library in various buildings, ranging from homes, office buildings, to Old Central where it was in the same room as the English Department. It was located there for seven years until Williams hall was constructed where it then moved to a room on the first floor. In nineteen twenty one the first building constructed solely for the purpose of housing the library was completed and that

is where the library was housed until nineteen fifty three with the completion of Edmon Low library.

Edmon Low was designed with five floors and a basement level that houses over one million volumes of books along with several resource centers for students looking for specific items. Along with that though, there are rooms for studying where students looking for some peace and quiet away from the rest of campus or simply to get out of their dorm can occupy for hours at a time. Within these rooms are white boards, though colored the university's signature orange, and televisions that students can use at their leisure. Featured outside the library, there is a fountain that is dyed the universities signature orange every year for homecoming as well as a bell tower on the top of the library that plays the Oklahoma State University Alma Mater. At night you can often see it lit up a soft blue color whenever there is no home game, on home game nights though you can often look up to see the bell tower is lit up a bright orange in an effort to show school spirit.

I took the opportunity to request an interview with Holly Reiter, a librarian at Edmon Low and professor with the university, about her time with the university and working in the library. Professor Reiter has been with Oklahoma State for five years since twenty sixteen, having previously worked a librarian's job in the northwestern state of Washington. "They had a job opening that fit my skills and I did the interview and managed to get the job so I moved here from Washington State." she explained to me during the interview. We talked about her moving and how coming to Oklahoma State was such a big move and how it was really beneficial to her career in the educational field. We discussed life in Stillwater and if she liked the

appeal of working in smaller cities and if the city was to her liking, "When I first came here it actually reminded me a lot of the town I grew up in and I really like smaller areas because I just feel like it's less hectic than a big city."

Having discussed her time in Stillwater and how she gets along with the city and how adjusting to living in a new state was, we began discussing more about the library itself. We discussed her time in Edmon Low and whether she enjoyed working there or not as the office space can appear to be a bit cramped. "No, I love it. I mean, I know for some people it can be a little confusing and big and overwhelming. But I went to grad school at a school of 40,000 people that had like 10 different libraries on campus. So yeah, so coming here like it's not super big to me, but it's big enough." she explained. We talked a bit more in depth about the building itself and how the view and architecture truly compliment the buildings around itself. "What would you say is your favorite part of the library to be in?" She thought about it for a moment before responding to me, "I really love being out in the front by the fountain. I think being there is just- I love listening to the water and watching people walk by, and then up on the fourth floor, where they have the big windows towards the front of the building that look out like, over the lawn and you can see like, across the whole campus, it's very pretty up there." It was very easy to understand where she was coming from as the Oklahoma sunsets are truly breathtaking and nearly incomparable to anywhere else in the world. She then went on to explain that since the floors have different levels of noise, that the fourth floor is probably the best in terms of relaxing and studying while watching the sunset. "It's one of the quiet study areas. So sometimes if I need to read something like an article or

something for work, I'll go up there and read and then I have the beautiful scenery and it's quiet so I can concentrate."

In summary, the Oklahoma State Library has brought together not only students and faculty, but an entire community in search of learning and furthering their knowledge. Edmon Low has done just this and has provided students with a safe space to study and relax, librarians with jobs, and faculty with resources for education, for over sixty eight years. That is a bit over half a hundred years of serving the people of Oklahoma State, and it's beautiful facade is tell-tale proof that it is truly the heart of campus. From its brick outlayer, to its carpeted and wood flooring, there is no other place to be than Edmon Low.
